Club changes since the previous competition

New HSC entrants in this season are: Southampton Cambridge returned, having appeared once before in the competition (in season 1905/06). The R.M.A. (Royal Marine Artillery) were from the Portsmouth area. Cup rule 5c (relating to the qualification of players residency) had to be waived to allow 2nd Battalion Wiltshire Regiment to compete as they didn't arrive at Gosport until the end of September 1911.

Not competing in this season having taken part in 1910/11 were:

East Cowes Victorias had ground problems having lost the use of the Norris Ground and played this season at the local recreation ground. The other non-competing teams were from the services: 2nd Grenadier Guards, 4th Middlesex Regiment, 2nd Inniskilling Fusiliers, 1st Royal West Kent Regiment, Inner Defences (Royal Garrison Artillery) and 1st Heavy Brigade.

Like their neighbours across the River Medina, Cowes also had ground issues as the owners needed the Brooklyn Ground for building purposes. The club did manage to negotiate their stay at the ground for one more season though. A further abbreviation (to the one shown above) R.M.L.I. = Royal Marine Light Infantry.

FINAL

The final needed a replay and it was played in May for the very first time. Football seasons ran strictly from the start of September until the end of April back then. This season, by special permission from the Football Association, was extended to raise funds for the Titanic disaster which occurred in April and affected many living in this area (particularly in Southampton). This was Cowes' first final appearance since 1906.

OTHER HAMPSHIRE F.A. COMPETITION WINNERS - SEASON 1911/12 JUNIOR CUP FINAL: CHRISTCHURCH 3-0 NEWPORT UNITED at The Dell, Southampton on 20th April 1912. Christchurch won five trophies in this very successful season (this included a big win over senior club Bournemouth F.C, in the Page-Coft Cup final). The losing side was the Newport F.C. club that exists today, this being their only season with this name, having amalgamated with the defunct Newport West End F.C. in the pre-season.

MINOR CUP FINAL: FAREHAM RES 2-1 CHARMINSTER-ROAD CONGREGATIONAL on 13th April 1912 at Shirley Cricket Ground (the home of Southampton Cambridge F.C.). Fareham recovered from a goal down at half-time to beat their Bournemouth-based opponents.

SEASONAL TRIVIA - 1911/12

In the Hampshire League - Southampton Res won the County Division, whilst the regional sections went to the emerging Basingstoke (North), Southampton Res (South - yes they won two divisions! and Boscombe (West). The 1st King's Royal Rifles won the Aldershot Military League. Moving on to cup winners, those of note were: Southampton Res (Southampton Senior Cup), 1st Leicestershire Regiment (Aldershot Senior Cup) and 1st Heavy Brigade, R.G.A. (Portsmouth Senior Cup, but they hadn't entered the H.S.C. in this season). The Royal Engineers had a remarkable season. Locally they won the North Hants May Cup and the Aldershot Charity Cup. Nationally, they reached the semi-final stage in the F.A. Amateur Cup, losing narrowly to eventual cup winners Stockton at the Old Spotted Dog Ground, Clapton. Whilst on the subject of the F.A. Amateur Cup, Hampshire League side Branksome Gasworks Athletic, who are later to make a mark in the H.S.C (when renamed Bournemouth Gasworks) reached the last 16 of the competition. They did win the Dorset Senior Cup, defeating Blandford 2-0 at Sterte, which was the Poole F.C. ground and, as the H.S.C. became 25-years old, there's a reminder of a couple of old neighbouring clubs' from the former Hants & Dorset competition days!! The Hampshire County representative team reached the final of the Southern Counties Amateur Championship and, despite having home advantage (Dean Court, Boscombe), were again unsuccessful, having been surprisingly defeated by Bedfordshire.
